## Research is at the Heart of Vermont Futures Project

Most will agree that our shared COVID experience in 2020 generated many questions about our community health. Likewise, it unearthed new questions about Vermont's economy.

In 2020, The Vermont Futures Project had the opportunity to discuss the state's economy with a wide variety of business, nonprofit, community, higher ed, and government leaders across Vermont. We cataloged the input and boiled down questions into a list of the top <u>Vermont economic research</u> topics that we think warrant further investigation. We submitted several research questions and ideas to <u>UVM's newly created Office of Engagement</u>. We are excited to play a role partnering with UVM and others on an Economic Resilience Assessment Project that will study Vermont's current community economic development condition and eventually provide Vermont stakeholders with actionable data and knowledge. ## Building Knowledge of and Engagement With VT Economy

Our priority in 2021 is to continue advancing research and data relevant to telling the story of this moment in time. We are planning a long-term "Economic Knowledge Campaign" that will engage and inform Vermonters on how Vermont's economy works and how it impacts our daily lives. Economic investment affects all Vermonters — our homes, jobs, health, schools, the taxes we pay, the natural environment around us, economic progress in our communities, and opportunities to achieve our dreams.
